## Why did we set up the Gale Ambassador Library Support Program?

To invest in key, priority customers to help them get the best out of the Gale resources they're accessing.

It has the same aims as libraries, to:

- Increase awareness of the Gale resources already available to students.
- Increase usage of these resources.
- Increase students' understanding of the resources (e.g. boost research skills).

## How does the program benefit the participating student?

#### **Financially**

Students are paid **Rs. 42,000/**-for a set quantity of activities.



## How does the program benefit the student body?



- Peer-to-peer support for students less confident speaking to staff.
- Ambassadors are well trained and confident presenting to their peers, and can deliver high-quality sessions.
- Students are best placed to understand the anxieties / challenges of other students, and tailor their training accordingly.
- **Increased awareness** amongst students of resources available to them, leading to richer research experiences and improved learning outcomes.

## How does the program benefit academic staff?




- Increased awareness amongst teaching staff of the archives available.


#### **Activities**

All ambassadors are expected to complete the core activities below. There are opportunities to complete additional activities, but these are not mandatory.

Within the academic year, the program requires:

- Writing 2 blog posts of 1000 words.
- Running 2 live events such as lecture presentations, workshops or tabletop stands, increasing awareness and understanding of the Gale archives.
- Posting 3 times about live events on channels seen by other students.
- Posting 10 tweets on the Gale Ambassadors' Twitter channel.
- Posting 6 times on external sites that will be seen by students about Gale's resources or ambassador activities.
- Completing 1 peer interview with a student who has used Gale Primary Sources.





## Which students are eligible?

A student from any year group studying a subject with the potential to use digital archives.

Whilst many ambassadors have studied History, others have studied English Literature, Politics, Sociology, Creative Writing, Marketing, Philosophy and more.

Prior use of the archives is not essential. The most important thing is a passion for history, archives, and helping others to learn!







## **Training and Support**

We offer the selected student extensive **live** training on the Gale resources and how to complete the ambassador activities.

Ambassadors also receive a comprehensive **Information Booklet** explaining each of the activities.

Students support one another through a team Whatsapp group.

Plus the program lead and regional manager stay in close contact with ambassadors throughout the year, offering additional help and assistance if required.







## Recruitment – getting the opportunity out to students

Due to the benefits outlined on previous pages, Gale Ambassadors are a popular resource, helping to achieve the library's own goals. We're unable to run the **Gale Ambassador Library Support Program** at every institution, but we're happy to be able to offer this fantastic opportunity to students at your university.

But to be able to do so, we need the library to share the role with students.

After this, we manage every stage of the program, from processing the many applications, to training students and supporting them throughout their time on the program. All the library need to do is use mechanisms available to you to share the role with students.

#### This can include:

- Your own library social media channels
- The library website
- Emailing relevant faculty administrators (e.g. History admin) for them to distribute pre-prepared materials to students. (Materials provided by Gale!)


The latter seems to be the simplest and quickest way to reach students.


We provide everything you need to do this in one handy Word Document! It includes a pre-prepared email/blog post and social post that direct students towards the application webpage.

## **Timing**

The deadline for student applications is **31**st **July 2024** 

Student selection and set-up (contracts etc.) will take place over the summer.

Training will take place in early September.

We will unfortunately not be able to run the program at your university if we have not received any suitable applications by 31<sup>st</sup> July 2024.
